

SOUTHERN METHODISTS IN BUTTE, MONTANA

Your pastor will be presenting at the Butte-Silver Bow Public Archives for the Brown Bag lunch on Wednesday, January 10th at noon. The forum is open to the public. The title for the talk is "Southern Methodists in Butte, Montana."

Saint Paul and Lowell Avenue are two of the churches that make up what we call Aldersgate today. These



congregations in Butte's history had a vibrant history and their buildings are still standing; one is unoccupied and the other is still a church. What sets Saint Paul and Lowell Avenue apart from Unity, Grace, and Mountain View is their origins. They were part of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. This denomination existed from 1840 to 1939. Eventually the ME, South joined with the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Protestant Church to form the Methodist Church in 1939. Today, after another merger, we are called The United Methodist Church.

So, how did southern Methodists establish not one but two congregations in a location just hours from the Canadian border? And was Saint Paul and Lowell Avenue really occupied by southern immigrants to Butte? These and a few more questions will be answered during the Brown Bag lunch. All are invited to attend.



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Thank You. God.

It is the week after Christmas, which means it is time for me to write thank-you notes. Hooray, I don't enjoy writing thank you notes but I grew up with a mother who made sure that this duty was handled promptly, or else. I remember she often used the story of the ten healed lepers and the 9 who did not return and thank Jesus for being healed. So, like every other kid of my generation, I was expected to thank grandma for the \$5 dollars on my birthday, even if I would have gladly paid \$5 to get out of sending the card.

Now you know what I was thinking about that led me to my topic for this article. Jesus healing the ten lepers, only one of whom actually returned to give thanks to Jesus and praise to God. Which led to the next thought. I don't give thanks and praise God near enough. I figured out I am better at whining to God than I am at praising God. Because after all it is so much easier for me to complain about what I didn't get or what I lost than it is for me to be thankful for what I have. I doubt that I am alone in this. I mean when is the last time you heard a tv newscaster say, "there were no mass shootings this week, thank the Lord" or "We give thanks for all the cancer treatments that save or extend so many lives." I heard a pastor say once that praise isn't stroking God's ego, telling God how awesome God is because God suffers from low self-esteem. Praising is about being thankful doubling the joy of what was received.

So rather than talk about praise, I thought that what I really needed this week on a spiritual level was to actually thank God.

¹¹On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. Thank you, God, for being the one who comes to us in the places where we often fail to notice, or where we fear to notice.

¹²As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, ¹³they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!"

Thank you, God, for being approachable and willing to listen.

¹⁴When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests."

Thank you, God, for seeing me, my hurt, my fear, my heart, and my humor. Thank you for how you have sent your people with their stories, gifts, and scars, so that I see you in them.

"And as they went, they were made clean."

Thank you, God, for bringing your people together to be healed and for the times we cause harm, foraive us.

¹⁵Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. Thank you, God, for the ones who turn back, who speak your name, and who remind me that you are real and that you are actively redeeming me and them and all of creation.

¹⁶He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. ¹⁷Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? 18 Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?"

Thank you, God, for revealing yourself in the foreigner, the outcast, and in doing so leading me through this sin-filled world to a more abundant life.

¹⁹Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."

Thank you, God, for all the things that have been healed and all the blessings received that I failed to notice. Thank you for this faith community at Aldersgate. Thank you for the chaos of children and grandchildren. Thank you for friends who call me back. Thank you for chocolate. Thank you for clean water and safe roads and electricity.
